Maison du Père welcomes people experiencing homelessness or hardship and offers services adapted to their realities to promote their stability.

Enabling everyone to be respected and to enjoy their rights as citizens with dignity, at every stage of their lives, is the ultimate goal.



Our resilience and team spirit enabled us to overcome many challenges again this year. Funding our essential services remains a challenge, while requests for help from people in distress are increasingly numerous and complex.

Despite all, our teams remain alert and always on the lookout for innovative solutions to meet the diverse needs of our clientele.

Aging and physical health problems remain at the heart of our concerns, as does the lack of affordable housing.

To meet these challenges effectively, Maison du Père maintains its associations with multi-sector partners: CHUM, SHDM, OMHM. SStrarting in december, 54 men will permanently occupy new subsidized studio.

MdP's actions are now focused on diversified residential stability. Joining our team means contributing to a sustainable investment to improve living conditions.







PREVENTION

800 people used our emergency shelter services for the first time

188 people avoided a first episode of homelessness

Losing a home

is now the main tipping point to the street. Addiction is no longer the leading cause of homelessness

594 interventions were carried out by the Maison du Père prevention team this year, to maintain the residential stability of 188 people.

58.5% of requests came from professionals in the health and social services network who found themselves working with a person at risk of becoming homeless. Without intervention by the Prevention team, these housing losses could have wiped out all the work done by the teams dedicated to residential stability at Maison du Père.

Thanks to the team's expertise, the majority of these people were able to be directed and accompanied towards a resource and services adapted to their specific needs, taking into account their age, state of physical and mental health, autonomy and so on.

OBSERVATION 2023

Maison du Père has been serving a clientele of men over 25 for 54 years. However, given the urgency of the distress calls received, we have had to relax our eligibility criteria and support women and families to ensure they remain in housing.





WELCOME & REFERRALS ACCOMMODATION CENTRE (CAHR)

4,690 estimated people experiencing homelessness *

1,394 people have used the CAHR services

35,040 overnight stays

The CAHR has 96 beds for men who need overnight accommodation, or who wish to embark on a residential stability process.

It is the largest gateway to our service continuum. The people who use it have access to a changing room, hygiene facilities, meals, etc

These services are free of charge.

Over the years, Maison du Père has developed a number of partnerships with professionals in the public and community sectors to make it easier for everyone to access the care and services they need.

Psychosocial counsellors are on hand every day to meet, guide and support the men on their journey.

OBSERVATION 2023

There was a significant increase in the number of undocumented refugees who sought our help. Our teams had to provide support for 126 asylum claims and/or work permits. We had to develop our expertise to meet this new need.



ACCÈS SANTÉ - COMMUNITY-BASED HEALTH CARE

110 people welcomed

Objectives: identification, continuity of care, relocation

3,648 registered overnight stays

People experiencing homelessness are often victims of systemic discrimination. Yet they have the right to be treated with dignity and without being judged.

There are 10 beds available at Maison du Père. The multidisciplinary Accès Santé team is on hand 24/7 to provide a range of specialized health care services in partnership with CHUM and CLSC professionals. Our participants can treat cancer, serious wounds or generalized infection in a safe and healthy environment.

This new trajectory not only improves the chances of recovery for patients without a home address, but also promotes their social reintegration.

Accès Santé also welcomes men who wish to access palliative care. Our team has developed the necessary expertise to support them. We are also supported by the Société de soins palliatifs à domicile du Grand Montréal.

OBSERVATION 2023

Around a hundred men have benefited from the community health care services of Maison du Père. Although the aim is to ensure their residential stability after their stay, it is becoming increasingly difficult to relocate people on a permanent basis, given the lack of housing adapted to their needs.

SOCIAL REINTEGRATION

104 participants took part in one of the following programs

Objectives : stability in the various spheres of their lives

5,691 refferals

The social reintegration service (RÉSO) offers an inhouse transitional housing program for men who need a certain amount of support to regain stability in the various spheres of their lives: health, employment, justice, housing, and so on.


In addition to a safe, affordable living environment and a range of essential services, participants are accompanied by a psychosocial counsellor to help them achieve their goals. Depending on their degree of autonomy, they are accommodated in rooms or studios. Two specialized programs are available to participants:

- Le Tremplin (employability approach)
- The John Howard program (social inclusion for men subject to judicial control)

2,860 volunteer hours contributed by our participants

OBSERVATION 2023

Many participants come to the RÉSO service after a 3-month stay at CAHR, where they were able to experience a period of stability and resume healthier lifestyle habits. Intervention workers notice a clear difference in these participants, who, feeling more at ease, are more willing to undertake a process of social reintegration.



HOUSING INTEGRATION & MAINTENANCE

129 people benefited from housing support

97% of participants maintained their residential stability

54 new subsidized studios, including 5 for veterans

Our staff's work doesn't stop once the men have found permanent accommodation. Housing support is essential for many of them to avoid a return to the street.


This support can be community-based, as at Maison Wolfe, a home with 57 low-cost rooms. Two members of the team are on hand to encourage people to live together, both in the building and in the neighbourhood.

Our outreach team also looks after the well-being of 72 men who live independently in private, social or rooming-house housing in various Montreal neighbourhoods.

Some require the support of a multi-disciplinary team, while others only need financial backing.

OBSERVATION 2023

Lack of housing is the main cause of homelessness in Quebec, and therefore represents our greatest challenge. The recent partnership with SHDM to create the Pavillon Robert-Lemaire, accompanied by financial support from the provincial government to ensure affordable rents and community support for participants, is the development model we want to replicate in the future.



PROJET LOGEMENT MONTRÉAL (PLM)

722 people have moved into housing since 2016

85% were maintained in housing

72 people,now autonomous,
no longer require follow-up

Maison du Père is a trustee of Projet Logement Montréal, which brings together the four largest homelessness organizations in Quebec: Maison du Père, Mission Bon Accueil, Mission Old Brewery and Accueil Bonneau.

This is the largest project in Canada dedicated to rapid placement in supportive housing for homeless people, regardless of gender. Each participant admitted to the project is paired with a psychosocial counsellor who works in tandem with a housing officer. The latter is responsible for finding a private home in the Greater Montreal area that meets the needs expressed by the participant.

To benefit from the PLM program, people must agree to be accompanied by a psychosocial counsellor to promote their social and community integration.

OBSERVATION 2023

Projet Logement Montréal benefits from Rent Supplement Program (RSP) units to enable selected participants to live in private or social housing, while paying rent similar to low-cost housing (25% of their income). However, even with RSP, the task proves difficult in times of housing shortage, as landlords are more selective.

RÉSIDENCE J.A. DESÈVE FOR SENIORS

65% suffer from a chronic illness

61% live with a mental health problem

75 % live with substance dependence

Résidence J.A. DeSève is the only retirement home adapted to the specific needs of seniors who have experienced homelessness. It was created to enable men who are disadvantaged in many areas of their lives to grow old with dignity and security.

The majority of the 87 residents have aged prematurely due to their previous lifestyle. They no longer have a supportive social or family network. They are not accepted in institutions that could help them

Some have a long history on the streets, while others found themselves there at an advanced age due to hardship.

However, ensuring residential stability and resuming healthy habits contribute to improving their overall health following admission to the residence.

1,562 participations in social, sporting and cultural activities

OBSERVATION 2023

In 2023, operating costs for the residence represented almost half of the total cost of all services of Maison du Père. The cost of a personnel with the expertise required to support the elderly experiencing physical and mental challenges is a major factor. Given their financial situation, we can't ask them to make up the shortfall.



- Diversify and increase government and private financial support.
- 2. Support participants as they move into the Robert-Lemaire Pavilion on December 1, 2023. The building will house 54 men, either homeless or at risk of homelessness, who will benefit from community support to break isolation, encourage mutual aid and adopt a healthy, active lifestyle.
- Raise the profile of Maison du Père and its Foundation by mobilizing, among other things, the various networks of donors and the business community to ensure the development of innovative projects.
- 4. Set up a major campaign to finance modernization work, which cannot be postponed, on the head office building, which accommodates over 250 people a day.
- Maintain the cybersecurity strategy to protect the personal information of participants, employees, volunteers and donors.
- **6.** Continue to diversify our residential stability offers to the 50+ age group.
